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Town Council Corner: Recent Policy Actions

Below is a summary of some of the approvals and decisions made by the Town Council during recent meetings. To see items coming up on agendas for future meetings, visit www.jupiter.fl.us/Agendas. To watch meetings live, or to watch recorded meetings on-demand, visit www.jupiter.fl.us/Live.

- **Jupiter Community Park Lighting:** Approved a contract with M. Gay Constructors, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$3,120,726 for the replacement of sport light fixtures and associated equipment at Jupiter Community Park.
- **New Town Hall and Town Green:** Approved special exception and site plan amendment applications to construct a new Town Hall building, community greenspace and parking lots on 22.5 acres located on the southwest corner of Indiantown Road and Military Trail.
- **Admirals Cove Golf Training Facility:** Approved a Large Scale Planned Unit Development amendment with a waiver request to reduce the width and depth of parking spaces to allow for golf cart parking. Also, a site plan amendment to add a golf training facility east of the existing clubhouse on golf course land located on 248.8 acres north of Frederick Small Road and west of Alternate A1A.
- **Cypress Drive Revitalization Landscape Contract:** Approved a contract in the amount of \$52,326.50 with Kimley-Horn and Associates for surveying, landscape and irrigation plans for Cypress Drive.
- **Sunoco at Sims Creek Plaza:** Approved a site plan amendment, including a pedestrian connection on the north end of the property, to modernize an existing gas station and convenience store located on 0.6 acres at 1651 West Indiantown Road.
- **Proclamations:** Issued proclamations recognizing March as Florida Bicycle Month, in support of the Jupiter Police Department and recognizing 18 years of service to the Town by Mayor Todd Wodraska.
- **Sea Grape Trimming and Exotic Removal:** Approved a contract with K&S Services of South Florida, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$98,900 for sea grape trimming and exotic removal along A1A.
- **Waste Management Franchise Agreement:** Approved an extension to the existing franchise agreement with Waste Management. The extension added 12 months to the existing agreement with an option to negotiate a future extension. The agreement also included a price adjustment from Waste Management to residential rates from \$14.38 to \$22.00 per residence per month.
- **Landscape and Irrigation Maintenance:** Approved the renewal of a contract with Terracon Services, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$1,027,049.10 for landscape and irrigation maintenance services at Town facilities, the Riverwalk and in roadway medians.
- **Park Landscape Maintenance:** Approved the renewal of a contract with Fresh Start Maintenance, Inc. in an amount not to exceed \$75,684 for landscape maintenance at 14 neighborhood parks.
- **Community Center Chiller Replacement:** Approved a contract with Precision Air Systems in an amount not to exceed \$357,696 for the replacement of the chiller at the Jupiter Community Center.
- **Emergency Equipment Installation:** Approved the renewal of a contract with Spartan Uplift Services, which had acquired Strobes-R-U's, for the purchase and installation of emergency equipment in Town police vehicles.
- **A1A Drainage Improvement Interlocal Agreement:** Approved a revised interlocal agreement with Palm Beach County for the joint funding of A1A drainage improvements.
- **March 8 Election Results:** Certified the results of the March 8 Municipal Election and swore-in Cheryl Schneider to Town Council.

Hurricane Season Begins June 1: Be Prepared

As hurricane season approaches, Floridians know that being prepared is the best strategy. Whether predictions for the upcoming season are active or not, having a plan for your family, your property and your business is important.

Similarly, the Town hopes for the best and prepares for the worst in its storm and severe weather preparations. In the event of a storm, the Town's Emergency Operations Center (EOC), located in the new Police Headquarters and Data Center building, becomes the hub for essential personnel. The Town's new EOC is able to withstand hurricane-force winds up to 192 mph, and provides a safe, centrally-located place for Town personnel. Members of law enforcement, Town management, communications and Information Systems gather at the EOC to manage activities before, during and after the storm. The Town's Chief of Police acts as Incident Commander during any emergency, coordinating operations among groups of essential personnel to ensure the safety of the community.

With preparation in mind, create your family's or business' plan before the June 1 start of hurricane season. Consider whether or not you will leave the area if a storm threatens, where your nearest shelter is located, create a supply list, and make preparations for pets, boats, homes and other property.

Every family and business has different things to consider when creating their storm plan. Protect our Natural Water Resources by Avoiding Fertilizer Use During the Rainy Season

Many commercially-available fertilizers contain nutrients like nitrogen and phosphorus that can become harmful runoff affecting the water quality in our creeks and rivers. To combat this issue, the Jupiter Town Council passed an ordinance in October, 2018 prohibiting the use of these fertilizers during the rainy season, which runs from June 1 through September 30. Residents, landscapers and lawn care businesses should avoid the use of these fertilizers when caring for plant life and lawns. Farms, golf courses and specialized turf areas (such as athletic fields) are exempt from the restrictions, but are encouraged to be careful about fertilizer application during the rainy season.

Many common fertilizers available at home improvement and lawn care stores most likely contain the harmful ingredients and are subject to the ban. There are alternative fertilizers that do not contain the chemicals that cause harmful runoff, and a list of acceptable fertilizers can be found at www.befloridiannow.org. 

Town of Jupiter Municipal General Election


The Town of Jupiter held its General Election on Tuesday, March 8. Residents voted for a First District seat opening as well as a Second District seat opening and for Town Mayor. In the First District, Cheryl Schneider was elected to a three-year term. The Second District election and Mayoral election both required a run-off election, since none of the candidates received more than 50 percent of the vote. The results of the run-off, which was held on Tuesday, March 22, were not available in time to make this issue of the Town Times, but results can be found at www.jupiter.fl.us/Election.

The Citizen Survey Results Are In

Every other year, the Town conducts a citizen survey of its residents to identify areas of strength and areas that have opportunity for improvement. Overall, the Town received high marks on livability and quality of life issues, but received some good feedback on areas to improve, particularly related to traffic, affordability and mobility. What's that Bulldozer For?



There are a number of construction projects in Jupiter that are underway. Check out the list below for information on some projects of interest. For additional details and a full list of major construction projects in Jupiter, visit www.jupiter.fl.us/CurrentMajorProjects.

- 1. Sonoma Isles:**
275 residential units, 150,000 square feet of bioscience/high tech office space, a 5,000 square feet restaurant and 14,750 square feet drugstore. The site is located at the northwest corner of Indiantown Road and the Florida Turnpike.
- 2. Spetter:**
A two-story building with 1,225 square feet of office and 5,160 square feet of warehouse on a 0.47± acre property. The site is located on the east side of Capital Street approximately 500 feet north of Jupiter Park Drive within the Jupiter Commerce Park.
- 3. Orion Systems:**
A 7,100 square feet office and industrial building on 0.47 acres located on the east side of Capital Street approximately 380 feet north of Jupiter Park Drive within the Jupiter Commerce Park.
- 4. Gray Motorsports:**
A warehouse and business office to be used for car storage and an auto repair building located on six lots of the Jupiter Commerce Park.
- 5. Symphony of Jupiter:**
A 20-lot subdivision on 8.5 acres located at 6262 and 6270 Roebuck Road.
- 6. Abacoa Dakota:**
A three-story building with commercial uses on the ground floor and 20 residential units on the upper floors to be located at the northwest corner of Dakota Drive and Williston Drive.
- 7. Abacoa Specialty Hospital:**
A specialty hospital located on the northeast corner of Innovation Way and Pioneer Road.
- 8. Abacoa Chabad:**
A religious facility and day care to be located at the southwest corner of University Boulevard and Quarry Knoll Way.
- 9. Jupiter Medical Center:**
A major expansion to the surgical center, emergency department and central energy plant on 27.3 acres located at 1240 Old Dixie Highway.
- 10. Concourse Plaza:**
The addition of outdoor seating and changing 3,318 square feet of retail space to 2,118 square feet of restaurant and 1,200 square feet of indoor recreation at 131 Alternate A1A.
- 11. Pink House:**
A retail facility located at 1011 Love Street.
- 12. Maltz Theatre:**
The expansion to the existing theater located at 1001 E. Indiantown Road.
- 13. Cornerstone:**
A mixed use building that includes 15 residential units and retail space. The site is located at 50 S. U.S. Highway 1.
- 14. Burrito Social:**
A modification to an existing outdoor seating area and the addition of an outdoor bar with 17 seats at a restaurant located at 251 S. U.S. Highway 1.
- 15. Water Pointe:**
The increase to the size of residential units, to allow two car garages and optional half stories, and a change in the architectural style from Mediterranean to Cracker as well as the construction of a pocket park on 4.2 acres located on the west side of U.S. Highway 1, approximately 850 feet north of the intersection with Ocean Way.

Fiscal Year 2022 Budget Process to Begin in June

Beginning in June, the Town Council will hold a series of public workshops and meetings to discuss the Town's proposed budget for fiscal year 2023, which begins on October 1, 2022. Day-to-day operations and personnel expenses will be incorporated into the proposed budget, along with funding necessary to work on completing any adopted strategic initiatives from the strategic plan. This ensures that the resources of the Town are focused on the areas that are most important to the Town Council and represent the feedback received from residents and businesses.

Workshops for the annual operating budget and 5-year Community Investment Program (CIP) will begin in June and lead up to the review and approval of the millage rate (property tax rate), budget and CIP in two public hearings in September. The budget and 5-year CIP cover the upcoming fiscal year, which begins on October 1 and ends September 30.

Jupiter Community Park Upgrades to Begin in April

Upgrades at Jupiter Community Park will begin in April with the replacement of existing sports lighting fixtures. The updates include transitioning the lights to LED, which will minimize glare in the surrounding communities. Work at the park will be phased, allowing only a portion of the overall park to be closed during a phase while the public can continue to enjoy the remainder of the park. The schedule for the phases includes:

- Basketball, Tennis and Volleyball Courts**
April 2022 through June 2022
- Baseball Fields (Major and Little League)**
July 2022 through September 2022
- Softball Fields**
October 2022 through December 2022
- Multipurpose Fields**
January 2023 through March 2023

The Cost of Jupiter's Award-Winning Water Remains Among the Lowest in the Region

Did you know that the Town of Jupiter Utilities uses some of the most advanced water treatment technologies to process up to 30 million gallons of water per day? Even though Jupiter Utilities uses some of the most advanced water treatment technologies, its rates are 27.2 percent lower than the average paid in the region spanning from St. Lucie County to Palm Beach County. Of the utilities using reverse osmosis treatment, Jupiter's rates are the lowest, over 34.3 percent below the average of what others charge.


A typical customer in Jupiter uses about 10,000 gallons per month. The table below illustrates typical residential water utility charges for a standard service.

Ask the Expert: Jupiter Quiet Zones

As Brightline has begun to send test trains through Jupiter, many residents are asking about the Town's commitment to ensuring that quiet zones are implemented. We asked the Town's traffic engineer, Chang-Jen Lan, some questions to find out the latest on quiet zones. Just to recap, quiet zones are railroad crossings where conductors are not required to blow their horn. Quiet zones are permitted when safety measures such as gates, medians and channelization devices are used at intersections to make the intersection safe without the need for a horn. The planned quiet zone in Jupiter would be established along the Florida East Coast (FEC) railroad corridor through the Town, approximately 5.2 miles running parallel to Alternate A1A, and would include all six railroad crossings along the route.

1. What is the status of the quiet zones?


Brightline has completed the safety improvements at all of the Jupiter railroad crossings except Riverside Drive. Brightline's schedule for completion at the Riverside crossing hasn't been determined and is dependent on the Loxahatchee River Railroad Bridge construction project. While waiting on that construction, the Palm Beach County Transportation Planning Agency (TPA) and the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) have applied for Federal grants to fund the completion of the four-quadrant gate system at the Center Street and Riverside Drive crossings. If the grants are awarded, this additional funding will also be used to fence portions of the railroad corridor. Once all safety improvements are complete, the TPA, in conjunction with the Town, can begin the process of applying to get them approved for quiet zones. Once that application is approved, then a quiet zone is established.

2. Who is in charge of applying for quiet zones in Jupiter?

The TPA has contracted with the Treasure Coast Regional Planning Council to assist municipalities in filing the necessary paperwork with the Federal Rail Administration (FRA) to establish quiet zones. This paperwork includes notice of intent and notice of establishment applications. Once all of the safety improvements are complete, applications for quiet zones can be submitted for FRA approval.

3. Who funds the required safety measures at crossings in order to implement the quiet zone?

In Jupiter's case, Brightline is paying for and constructing the required safety measure upgrades at the railroad crossing intersections. The only railroad crossing that hasn't been completed is at Riverside Drive. Then, the TPA will identify and fund the additional supplemental safety measures through grants.

Proper Tree Trimming Really Does Make a Difference

Pruning tree limbs regularly has many benefits; it improves the tree's structure, encourages proper growth and enhances the tree's appearance. However, pruning a tree the wrong way can cause major problems. Here are a couple things not to do when pruning. Topping, or hat-racking, causes the tree to put out clusters of poorly-attached weak branches and can initiate decay in those branches because it prevents them from healing. This practice is equivalent to butchering a tree. Another common pruning error is excess lifting or removing most small branches along a main branch, leaving only a tuft of leaves in the end. Lifting trees is a common pruning practice where the lower branches are removed to provide clearance for cars or structures, but over-lifting or excessive thinning increases the chances of branch breakage in storms.
