



Town Council Corner: Recent Policy Actions

Below is a summary of some of the approvals and decisions made by the Town Council during recent meetings. To see items coming up on agendas for future meetings, visit www.jupiter.fl.us/Agendas. To watch meetings live, or to watch recorded meetings on-demand, visit www.jupiter.fl.us/Live.

- **March 22 Run-Off Election Results:** Certified the results of the March 22 Run-Off Election and swore-in Jim Kuretski as Mayor and Malise Sundstrom to Town Council.
- **Proclamation:** Issued a proclamation recognizing Officer Guy Kitchens, who selflessly donated a kidney to a retired fellow Law Enforcement Officer.
- **Town of Jupiter Vice Mayor:** Selected Councilor Ron Delaney to serve as the Town of Jupiter Vice Mayor for 2022-2023.
- **Strategic Plan:** Adopted the Strategic Plan for fiscal year 2023. See the full plan online at www.jupiter.fl.us/StrategicPlan.
- **Sports Lighting:** Approved a purchase order with Musco Lighting, LLC in an amount not to exceed \$2,099,356 for sports lighting materials at Jupiter Community Park.
- **Curbing and Asphalt Repairs:** Approved a contract in an amount not to exceed \$202,073 with E&F Florida Enterprises for curbing and asphalt repairs at New Haven and The Island at Abacoa.
- **Police Vehicle Purchase:** Approved the purchase of 14 vehicles with an anticipated cost of \$495,915.56.
- **School Crossing Guard Services:** Approved a three-year contract in the amount of \$172,635 annually with The Butler Group of South Florida for school crossing guard services.
- **Longshore Drive and Northfork Drive Right of Way:** Approved an interlocal agreement and County deed for the transfer of jurisdictional control of right of way ownership, operation and maintenance of Longshore Drive and Northfork Drive from Palm Beach County to the Town of Jupiter.
- **Homeless Resource Center:** Approved the second amendment to the interlocal agreement renewal with Palm Beach County for the transportation and acceptance of individuals into the Homeless Resource Center.
- **Island Way Well Site Development Improvements:** Approved a contract in an amount not to exceed \$818,000 with Hinterland Group, Inc. for site development of three Floridan Aquifer well sites and four surficial aquifer well sites that will provide raw water to the Town's water plant.
- **A1A and Jupiter Beach Road Roundabout:** Decided not to approve a contract for the construction of a roundabout as well as sidewalk and street lighting replacement at the intersection of A1A and Jupiter Beach Road. Directed staff to re-bid the project.
- **Road Striping:** Approved the renewal of the annual road striping contract in an amount not to exceed \$132,641.82 with Southwide Industries, Inc.
- **Bayside Building Parking:** Approved a non-exclusive Licensing Agreement for off-site parking on Town-owned land for the Bayside Building located at 1001 Alternate A1A, south of Sawfish Bay Park.
- **Jupiter Park Drive and Central Boulevard Intersection Improvements:** Approved an interlocal agreement and easement agreements with the Loxahatchee River Environmental Control District for construction of the Jupiter Park Drive and Central Boulevard intersection improvements.
- **State Forfeiture Funds:** Approved the donation of \$5,000 in state forfeiture funds to the Gulf Stream Council's Learning for Life Explorer program to support the Law Enforcement Explorer Academy.
- **Town Boards, Committees and Countywide Organizations Appointments:** Approved the 2022 appointments to Town of Jupiter Boards and Committees as well as to countywide organizations.
- **Fleet Fuel:** Approved the continued use of State Term Contract No. 15100000-19-1 for the purchase of fleet fuel. Also approved a purchase order in an amount not to exceed \$900,000 in Fiscal Year 2023 with Pro Energy Fleet Fueling, LLC.
- **Jupiter Medical Center:** Approved a site plan amendment to construct an addition to the central energy plant on a 27.3 acre property located at 1210 Old Dixie Highway.
- **America Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) Funds:** Accepted ARPA funds in the amount of \$3,795,479 and appropriated the funds to the Pine Gardens North and Fisherman's Landing infrastructure improvement projects.
- **Pine Gardens North Infrastructure Improvements:** Approved a contract in an amount of \$3,273,930.70 with Municipal Contractors, Inc. for improvements to stormwater and water main infrastructure in areas of Pine Gardens North.
- **Town Manager Contract:** Approved the employment agreement with Frank Kitzerow for the Town Manager position and authorized the Mayor to sign the agreement.
- **Private Property Rights:** Approved a Comprehensive Plan amendment to add a Property Rights Element, as required by Florida Statutes Section 163.3177(6)(i)1. The purpose of the Property Rights Element is to ensure that private property rights are considered in local decision making. The second reading will be at the July 19 Town Council meeting.
- **New Town Hall:** Approved Change Order No. 5 to the Town's contract with Kaufman Lynn Construction that accepted the Guaranteed Maximum Price (GMP) amendment for the construction of the new Town Hall building for an amount not to exceed \$24,794,051.

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Frank Kitzerow Named New Town Manager

At its regular meeting on Tuesday, April 19, the Jupiter Town Council voted to appoint Frank Kitzerow as the new Town Manager. Kitzerow had served as the Interim Town Manager since December 8.

He previously was the Chief of Police for the Town of Jupiter from 2005 through 2018, after which he served as the Chief of Police and School Safety Specialist for the Palm Beach County School District from 2018 through 2021. During his time with the School District, Kitzerow became nationally recognized as an expert in school safety.

Kitzerow also served as the Chief of Police for the City of Portsmouth, Va. from 2003 through 2005. He began his career in law enforcement with the Fairfax County, Va. Police Department in 1979.

As Town Manager, Kitzerow oversees all Town employees and manages the day-to-day operations of the Town.



Back to School Traffic Safety

School is back in session beginning Wednesday, August 10. To ensure our children safely get to and from school, please remember to drive carefully and follow these traffic safety tips:

- Be aware of school zones and observe the yellow flashing school zone lights and speed limit signs.
- Do not pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children.
- Always stop when directed to do so by an officer or a school crossing guard.
- Do not block crosswalks and watch for kids walking and biking through crosswalks.
- **Stay alert while driving and don't text and drive.**



Public Budget Workshops & Hearings: Fiscal Year 2023

The Town of Jupiter's proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2023, which begins October 1, 2022, will be heard in two public budget hearings tentatively set for Tuesday, September 6 and Tuesday, September 20. Both hearings will be held at 7:00 pm at the Jupiter Town Hall Council Chambers (210 Military Trail).

Public budget workshops are held in advance of the public hearings. This year, the first workshop was held on Thursday, June 23 and the second is tentatively scheduled for Thursday, August 11.

Jim Kuretski was elected to a three-year term as Mayor while Malise Sundstrom was chosen to serve a three-year term from the Second District. The new Town Council consists of: Mayor Jim Kuretski, Vice Mayor Ron Delaney (second district), Councilor Cam May (first district), Councilor Cheryl Schneider (first district) and Councilor Malise Sundstrom (second district).

Be Prepared for Hurricane Season

Hurricane season is underway, and the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration has already predicted it to be a busy one. If this isn't your first hurricane season in Florida, you may have already stocked up on water, batteries and non-perishable foods. However, you may have missed some lesser-known tasks that should be on everyone's hurricane checklist.

Landscaping Check

It is important to properly prune trees and palms to help them withstand winds and to prevent limbs from becoming flying debris in a storm. Prune your trees regularly, but do not prune or landscape when a storm is approaching since yard waste can become projectiles in the storm. Be aware that certain tree trimming services are offered at this time of year specifically for storm prep, but they often employ pruning methods that are a violation of Town Code and can, in fact, damage the tree. Be sure your landscape company uses a certified arborist for proper pruning. For more information, call our Natural Resources staff at **561-741-2565**.

Follow Town Code for Safety

Some code violations can lead to safety issues if a storm hits. Below are tips from the Code Compliance Division to help make sure your structures are secure for hurricane season.

- 🔧 Remove accumulated items from yards so they don't become flying debris in a storm.
- 🔧 Finish up home projects to make homes more secure before a storm hits. For example, repair loose or damaged areas of fencing, particularly where pools exist.
- 🔧 Repair roofs, broken windows or doors to help maintain the structure's integrity.
- 🔧 Use proper storm shutters or plywood installation. Taping windows for a storm is not safe or effective.

Post-Storm Plan

Before a storm ever forms, it is important to know where and how to receive information after a storm. In the event that Jupiter is impacted by a storm, residents should expect some Town services to remain suspended for three business days or more depending on the storm's severity. State of Florida Sales Tax Holidays

In the months ahead, the State of Florida is offering a number of sales tax holidays. These holidays cover a wide range of items from children's goods to admission to entertainment as well as a wide-range of household necessities. A brief description of each of the sales tax holidays, along with their start and end dates, are listed below.

Children's Books - through August 14: Consumers can purchase qualifying children's books, including fiction or non-fiction books primarily intended for children ages 12 and younger. Qualifying books include: board books; picture books; beginning reader books; juvenile chapter books; and middle grade books.

Freedom Week: July 1-7: Consumers can purchase qualifying recreation and outdoor items as well as admissions to entertainment and cultural events. Included categories include: fishing supplies; camping supplies; sports equipment; boating and water activity supplies; pool supplies; and general outdoor supplies.

Baby and Toddler Clothing and Children's Diapers - July 1, 2022-June 30, 2023: Consumers can purchase qualifying children's diapers and clothing, including: baby and toddler clothing; apparel and shoes primarily intended for children ages 5 and under; single-use diapers; reusable diapers; and reusable diaper inserts.

Energy Star Appliances - July 1, 2022-June 30, 2023: Consumers can purchase: clothes dryers priced \$1,500 or less; refrigerators or combination refrigerator/freezers selling for \$3,000 or less; washing machines selling for \$1,500; or less or water heaters selling for \$1,500 or less.

Home Hardening - July 1, 2022-June 30, 2024: Consumers can purchase: impact-resistant doors; impact-resistant garage doors; and impact-resistant windows.

Back-to-School - July 25-August 7: Consumers can purchase: clothing, footwear and certain accessories priced \$100 or less per item; certain school supplies priced \$50 or less; learning aids and jigsaw puzzles priced \$30 or less; and personal computers and certain computer-related accessories priced \$1,500 or less when purchased for noncommercial use.

Tool Time - September 3-9: Consumers can purchase qualifying items related to tools commonly used by skilled trade workers, with limits extending by category up to items priced at \$300 or less.

Motor Fuel - October 1-31: The Florida Motor Fuel Tax Relief Act of 2022 reduces the tax rate on motor fuel by 25.3 cents per gallon and applies to all gasoline products, any product blended with gasoline and any fuel placed in the storage supply tank of a gasoline-powered motor vehicle.

Business Community Liaison Here to Help Town Businesses

In April, the Town of Jupiter launched the Business Community Liaison, which is dedicated to helping Jupiter businesses navigate Town processes and regulations. The Business Community Liaison can help with: direction on development applications, building permits and special event applications; explaining rules and regulations; ensuring governmental regulations are satisfied; making the business community aware of assistance programs and grants; and contact with other government agencies, such as Palm Beach County. In acting as a liaison with other Town departments, the Business Community Liaison aims to streamline communication and make the process of working through Town processes more efficient.

2022 Matching Grant Recipients Announced

On May 3, Town Council approved \$15,803.74 in Neighborhood Matching Grants to four different neighborhood groups throughout Jupiter. Grants were awarded for: the repair, painting and the addition of signage at six perimeter monuments at Antigua; the replacement of directional and address signs at Augusta; the installation of sidewalk lighting at Jupiter Cove; and the installation of an ADA compatible chair lift at the community pool at Sea Palm. Since funds are still available, the Matching Grant Program will remain open on a first come-first served basis until the remaining funds from 2022 are expended. Neighborhood Matching Grants are awarded every year and are intended for visible neighborhood improvements or security enhancements. Matching grants leverage private funding by requiring a 50 percent match, which can consist of cash, donated material or labor. Each grant award can be as much as \$5,000. Additionally, the initiative to participate in the program must come from residents and their associations. The next grant cycle begins in February 2023. Water Quality & Conservation Efforts

Jupiter residents are keenly aware of the responsibility we share to protect our beautiful natural resources. Over the years, the Town has taken measures to not only preserve the quality of our water, but also conserve its use to ensure its longevity. The Town has a 30-year old ordinance outlining its Water and Irrigation Program that provides guidance on the prudent use of water and landscape irrigation.

Address Type	Irrigation Days and Times
Odd-numbered addresses	Mondays, Wednesdays, and/or Saturdays 4pm - 10 am
Even-numbered addresses*	Tuesdays, Thursdays, and/or Sundays 4pm - 10am

*Even and odd addresses irrigated on the same systems/zones should be watered on the days for even-numbered addresses (this may include multi-family units and homeowner associations).

**Areas irrigated by treated wastewater or reused water are exempt from these restrictions.

As a reminder, in an effort to protect our water quality, the use of fertilizers during rainy season (June 1 through September 30) is prohibited. Many commercial fertilizers contain nutrients, like nitrogen and phosphorus, which can become harmful runoff affecting water quality. Common fertilizers available at home improvement and lawn care stores most likely contain these ingredients and are subject to the ban. Residents and businesses should consider alternative fertilizers or "Florida-friendly" landscaping options that do not present a threat to our water quality (visit www.befloridiannow.org for more information). Ask the Expert: Kate Moretto Strategic Planning Process

What is the Town's Strategic Plan, and what is its purpose?

The Strategic Plan drives the activities and financial plan for the Town. It describes the goals and objectives that the Town wants to achieve, or put another way, what the Town of Jupiter wants to become. A good analogy is that the Strategic Plan can be compared to a house. The vision and mission are like the roof of a house, spanning the entire structure at the highest level. The floors of the house are the various components that make up the structure of the building. The top floor can be thought of as the Strategic Results – the higher-level objectives that the Town wants to achieve. The bottom floor represents the Strategic Initiatives and Action Plans, which are the projects and programs that the various departments within the Town offer to support achieving the results. And the foundation is a solid financial plan that supports the strategic initiatives and the rest of the house.

How is the Strategic Plan developed, and when?

Each year, the Town Council reviews and updates its strategic plan. Beginning in December, a review of progress and accomplishments provides a basis for the updates. Then, drawing from community input, economic factors, and community trends, new ideas and areas of focus are gathered. At a public workshop in January, members of Town Council propose updates and share new ideas. After Town Staff has gathered the input and summarized the proposed updates and changes, a follow-up public workshop is held in February to prioritize strategic initiatives. This important step helps to focus the plan to ensure that the “list” of items in the final plan doesn’t exceed the funding or resources available to the Town. Once the prioritization is complete, the final Strategic Plan is placed on a Town Council agenda for final adoption, typically in early March. Last, the plan is published on the Town’s website at www.jupiter.fl.us/StrategicPlan, and shared via email and social media platforms.

How does the Strategic Plan process impact the Town's budget?

Each year, once the updated Strategic Plan is adopted in March, Town Staff begins the process of incorporating the Strategic Initiatives into the proposed budget for the coming year. Sometimes initiatives require operational spending or human resources that need to be included in the budget proposal. Sometimes initiatives will require a capital investment, so those needs are evaluated and estimated for inclusion in the capital portion of the Town’s budget. Initiatives that span multiple years may need to be considered in the Town’s 5-year Community Investment Program (CIP), adopted each year along with the budget. The proposed operating budget and CIP is developed throughout the summer months, with public workshops typically held in June and August. After two public budget hearings in September, the Town officially adopts the budget, millage (property tax) rate, and CIP for the upcoming year beginning October 1.

How often does Town staff update residents on the progress of current strategic initiatives?

As progress is made on strategic initiatives throughout the year, updates are provided to Town Council through quarterly reports and update presentations at regular Council meetings. Often as initiatives are completed, Staff includes feature articles in the Town Times, and features videos and announcement on its website, social media sites, and in emails to residents.



Homestead Exemption Outreach Begins this September

Floridians know that something unique about living in a state where so many people love to vacation is the Homestead Exemption that is filed with your property taxes. Although this exemption only needs to be filed once for each property and will then carry over annually, it is important for first-time filers to know the requirements and deadlines for this tax exemption that can significantly reduce their property tax.

Staff from the Palm Beach County Property Appraiser’s Office, Division of Education Services, will be on-hand at the Jupiter Community Center throughout the fall to help residents submit their Homestead Exemption application and answer any property valuation questions. The sessions will be held at the Jupiter Community Center. Dates and times for these event will be posted at www.jupiter.fl.us/Homestead as soon as available.

Some helpful information to know about the Homestead Exemption is you must hold the legal title to a residential property by January 1 of the application year, and the property for which you are seeking exemption must be your primary, permanent residence. You also must be a legal resident of Florida by January 1 of the initial application year.

There are also different types of Homestead Exemptions that can be applied for, including the up to \$25,000 Homestead Exemption; the additional \$25,000 Homestead Exemption; a Senior Citizen Exemption; a \$5,000 Disabled Veterans Exemption; a Combat-disabled Senior Veterans Exemption; and a \$500 Widow/Widower Exemption.

Applications are accepted by mail or in-person at any time throughout the year, but in order for the exemption to be considered for the upcoming tax year, the application must be received by March 1 of the qualifying year. A copy of your deed and proof of residency is required for filing. For proof of residency, you may submit a copy of your Florida driver’s license, voter registration or permanent residency card. In lieu of a pending permanent resident alien card, the Federal Form I485, “Approval Notice for Application to adjust to Permanent Resident Status,” is accepted.
