



Town Council and CRA Commission Corner: Recent Policy Actions

Below is a summary of some of the approvals and decisions made by the Town Council and CRA Commission during recent meetings. TOWN COUNCIL

- **Town Vice Mayor:** Cheryl Schneider was selected as the Vice Mayor for the next 12 months.
- **Installation and Swearing-In Ceremony:** Ron Delaney and Cameron May were sworn in and installed to the Town Council.
- **Harbourside:** An approved planned unit development (PUD) was amended to modify previously-approved conditions of approval in regards to parking, sound and events at Harbourside. An approved site plan was also amended to modify uses and address parking and outdoor seating and to repeal authorization to create an outdoor venue.
- **Seagrape Trimming and Exotic Removal:** A contract renewal in an amount not to exceed \$103,845 was approved with K&S Services of South Florida for seagrape trimming and exotic removal along A1A.
- **Jupiter River Estates Non-Ad Valorem Assessment:** A non-ad valorem assessment to cover the cost of canal vegetation trimming on a biennial basis was approved for residents of Jupiter River Estates.
- **Street Sweeping Services:** A contract with an estimated budget of \$99,991.90 with Facilities Pro-Sweep for street sweeping was approved.
- **Town Vehicle and Equipment Replacement:** The purchase of 15 police patrol Ford Explorers in the amount of \$897,585 was approved, as was the purchase of a Caterpillar 908M Compact Articulating Wheel Loader in the amount of \$134,810 and two vehicles for the Utilities and Building departments in the amount of \$57,508.
- **Community Vulnerability Assessment:** A Vulnerability Assessment to address the impacts of flooding and sea level rise was approved at a cost of \$259,838. The assessment is needed to apply for a Resilient Florida Grant
- **Parks Landscape Maintenance:** A contract in the amount of \$82,618.20 was awarded for landscape maintenance at the Town's parks.
- **Irrigation and Landscape Maintenance:** A contract in the amount of \$1,078,401.56 was awarded for irrigation and landscape maintenance at Town facilities, along the Riverwalk and in Town-owned medians.
- **New Town Hall Cabling and Council Chamber Audio Visual:** Town Council awarded a contract in the amount of \$265,208 to install low voltage cabling in the new Town Hall facility as well as a contract for the installation of audio visual and presentation equipment for the building's new Council Chambers in the amount of \$220,886.23.
- **Cybersecurity Protection:** A contract in the amount of \$94,388.50 was awarded for managed cybersecurity detection and response protection.
- **Risk Management Safety Award:** The Public Risk Underwriters of Florida, Inc. recognized the Town for its Risk Management program.
- **Jupiter Medical Center Expansion:** Town Council authorized a site plan amendment for an expansion that includes a five-story addition and a five-level parking garage on the east side of the existing building and a zoning text amendment to change the location and copy of signage located around the Medical Center.
- **Fire Protection and Emergency Medical Services:** Town Council approved an Interlocal Agreement with Palm Beach County for Fire and EMS services.
- **2023-24 Strategic Plan:** The Town's 2023-2024 Strategic Plan was approved and adopted.
- **Water Plant Training and Data Facility:** Council approved a site plan amendment for the Town to construct a new two-story hardened training and data facility at the Town's Water Plant.
- **Town Boards and Committees Appointments:** Council approved appointments to the Town Boards and Committees as well as to county-wide organizations.
- **State Forfeiture Funds:** The use of state forfeiture funds in the amount of \$5,000 was approved for a donation to the Gulf Stream's Council Learning for Life Explorer Program to support the Law Enforcement Explorer Academy. Council also approved using \$9,868 to host the annual Jupiter Police Soccer Tournament.
- **Jupiter Police Department Headquarters:** Town Council approved naming the Jupiter Police Department headquarters building after Chief Glynn Mayo, who served as Jupiter's Chief of Police from 1955 through 1987.
- **Water Plant Pilot Unit:** A contract in the amount of \$515,100 for the design, fabrication and installation of a pilot unit at the Town's reverse osmosis treatment facility was approved.
- **Cypress Drive Commercial Matching Grant Program:** Two grant applications in the amount of \$25,000 each were approved.
- **Neighborhood Matching Grant Program:** Town Council awarded grants, totaling \$45,018.75, to 10 neighborhoods as part of the Town's Matching Grant program. The program provides grants for visible neighborhood improvements and/or safety enhancements, and require an equal or greater match by the neighborhood.
- **Florida League of City and County Management Association (FCCMA) Recognition:** The FCCMA honored Jupiter for 45 years as a Council-Manager form of government. The Town was lauded for its commitment to upholding high ethical and professional standards.
- **Public Access Easement Release:** A partial release of a Public Access Easement, which will be used for modified on-street angled parking and sidewalks along South Bismark Lane and South Williston Drive as part of the Dakota Apartments development project, was approved.
- **Deep Injection Well Site Improvements:** A construction contract, in the amount of \$608,405, was approved for site improvements at the water treatment plant in preparation for construction of a deep injection well.
- **Ritz Carlton Planned Unit Development Amendment:** Town Council approved an amendment to an approved Planned Unit Development that will convert an existing single-family residence at 614 White Pelican Way to a guest cottage associated with 612 White Pelican Way.

Community Redevelopment Agency

- **CRA Plan Amendments:** An Interlocal Agreement with the Treasure Coast Regional Planning Council for planning assistance services to amend the CRA Plan was approved.
- **Love Street Parking Lot:** The Executive Director was authorized to sign non-exclusive parking lot agreements with Guanabana's, Castaways and Jupiter Outdoor Center for parking at the CRA's Love Street parking lot.

Town Website Gets New Look

Town Hall Construction Update

Residents who have recently visited the municipal complex may have noticed that the new Town Hall is beginning to take shape. The current Town Hall which opened in 1981 will be replaced by a new two-story building that includes a new Town Council Chambers and a one-stop lobby for residents coming in to get permits or pay bills. The building is on schedule to be completely closed in by mid-July and open to the public in early 2024.

The new Town Hall will be hardened to withstand major hurricanes. During construction, Town Hall, the Jupiter Community Center and the Jupiter Police Department remain open.



Public Budget Workshops and Hearings: Fiscal Year 2024

The Town of Jupiter's proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2024, which begins October 1, 2023, will be heard in two public budget hearings tentatively set for Tuesday, September 5 and Tuesday, September 19. Both hearings will be held at 7:00 pm at the Jupiter Town Hall Council Chambers (210 Military Trail).



Public budget workshops are held in advance of the public hearings. This year, the first workshop was held on Thursday, June 22 and the second is tentatively scheduled for Thursday, August 10.

Be Prepared for Hurricane Season

If this isn't your first hurricane season in Florida, you may have already stocked up on water, batteries and non-perishable foods. However, you may have missed some lesser-known tasks that should be on everyone's hurricane checklist.

Landscaping Check

It is important to properly prune trees and palms to help them withstand winds and to prevent limbs from becoming flying debris in a storm. Prune your trees regularly, but do not prune or landscape when a storm is approaching since yard waste can become projectiles in the storm. Be aware that certain tree trimming services are offered at this time of year specifically for storm prep, but they often employ pruning methods that are a violation of Town Code and can, in fact, damage the tree. Be sure your landscape company uses a certified arborist for proper pruning. You can verify a credential or search for a local arborist at www.TreesAreGood.org. Follow Town Code for Safety

Some code violations can lead to safety issues if a storm hits. Below are tips from the Code Compliance Division to help make sure your structures are secure for hurricane season.

- Remove accumulated items from yards so they don't become flying debris in a storm.
- Finish up home projects to make homes more secure before a storm hits. For example, repair loose or damaged areas of fencing, particularly where pools exist.
- Repair roofs, broken windows or doors to help maintain the structure's integrity.
- Use proper storm shutters or plywood installation. Taping windows for a storm is not safe or effective.

Storm Information

It is important to know where and how to receive information before, during and after a storm. In the event that Jupiter is impacted by a storm, residents should expect some Town services to remain suspended for three business days or more depending on the storm's severity. Waste Management Pick-Up Reminders

In March, the Town's waste disposal provider, Waste Management, introduced upgraded, trash carts for automated trash collection. Here are some tips for seamless usage:

- Make sure all trash bags are inside the garbage cart.
Bag trash outside of the cart will not be picked up.
- Place your cart out the night before collection day.
- Ensure the wheels are facing your property.
- Keep the cart area clear of obstacles.

The Cost of Jupiter's Award-Winning Water Remains Among the Lowest in the Region

Even though the Town of Jupiter Utilities uses some of the most advanced water treatment technologies, its rates are 27.1 percent lower than the average paid in the region spanning from St. Lucie County to Palm Beach County. Of the utilities using reverse osmosis treatment, Jupiter's rates are the lowest, over 35.7 percent below the average of what others charge. A typical customer in Jupiter uses about 10,000 gallons of water per month. The table below illustrates typical residential water utility charges for a standard service.

Free Home Hurricane Inspection



The state's My Safe Florida Home program allows residents to get a free complete home hurricane inspection, detailing the strength of the home and recommended improvements. The program does also offer grant money for residents for improvements including:

- Reinforcing roof to wall connectors
- Installing secondary water resistance for the roof
- Upgrading the roof covering
- Improving the strength of roof deck attachments
- Exterior door upgrades
- Garage door upgrades
- Window upgrades

Residents may be eligible to apply for two dollars in state grant money for every one dollar they spend on eligible home strength improvements. The state grant is for a maximum amount of \$10,000, and the applicant's home must be located in a designated wind-borne region to qualify. The state has also eliminated state sales tax on purchases of impact-resistant doors, impact-resistant garage doors and impact-resistant windows through June 30, 2024. Participating in the program may also potentially lower the homeowner's insurance premiums.

2023 Neighborhood Matching Grant Recipients Announced

On May 16, Town Council approved \$45,018.75 in Neighborhood Matching Grants to 10 different neighborhood groups throughout Jupiter. Grants were awarded for items including landscape work, repaving, security upgrades and fence replacement. Neighborhoods that received funding were Egret Landing, Fisherman's Landing, Jupiter Ocean and Racquet Club, Maple Isle, Olympus, Pine Crest, Rialto, Ridge at the Bluffs, Sea Brook Place, and Villa Diamante.

Neighborhood Matching Grants are awarded every year and are intended for visible neighborhood improvements or security enhancements. Matching Grants leverage private funding by requiring a 50 percent match, which can consist of cash, donated material or labor. Each grant award can be as much as \$5,000. Additionally, the initiative to participate in the program must come from residents and their associations. The next grant cycle begins in February 2024.

Sargassum Seaweed on Jupiter Beaches

Next time you head to the beach, you may notice brown seaweed covering parts of the shoreline. Blooms of Sargassum, a brown-colored seaweed, typically appear on the beaches during the spring and throughout the summer.



It is important to note that Sargassum is naturally occurring and provides an important habitat for migratory organisms including crabs, shrimp, sea turtles and fish such as tuna and marlin. Sargassum accumulations also can help make beaches more resilient to erosion from storms.

While it does have a lot of positive impacts, Sargassum can be considered a nuisance. Large accumulations may result in unpleasant odors and can also irritate the eyes, nose and throat.

Palm Beach County maintains Jupiter's beaches and has a "hands-off" management approach to Sargassum accumulations, due to the natural benefits of the seaweed.

Mail-In-Ballot Must Be Requested After Every General Election Cycle



Voters who wish to receive a vote-by-mail ballot for the 2023 through 2024 elections are required to complete a new vote-by-mail ballot request under Florida's new election law.

Updated vote-by-mail requests will be valid until December 31, 2024. After the next general election, voters will need to make the request again, and it will need to be renewed after every general election cycle for future elections.

Back to School Traffic Safety

Jupiter's Police Department is kicking off a new campaign called "Slow Down in Our Town" this summer. This campaign aims to educate and remind residents and visitors the importance of driving at safe speeds throughout the Town. As school resumes on Thursday, August 10, here are some easy safety tips to follow:

- Be aware of school zones and observe the yellow flashing school zone lights and speed limit signs.
- Do not pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children.
- Always stop when directed to do so by an officer or a school crossing guard.
- Do not block crosswalks and watch for kids walking and biking through crosswalks.
- Stay alert while driving and don't text and drive.

Water Quality & Conservation Efforts

Jupiter residents are keenly aware of the responsibility we share to protect our beautiful natural resources. Over the years, the Town has taken measures to not only preserve the quality of Jupiter's water, but also conserve its use to ensure its longevity. The Town's code outlines its Water and Irrigation Program and provides guidance on the prudent use of water and landscape irrigation.

Irrigation Days and Times for Residential, Commercial, Industrial, Institutional and Governmental Properties

Odd-numbered addresses	Mondays, Wednesdays, and/or Saturdays 4:00 pm – 10:00 am
Even-numbered addresses*	Tuesdays, Thursdays, and/or Sundays 4:00 pm - 10:00 am

*Even and odd addresses irrigated on the same systems/zones should be watered on the days for even-numbered addresses (this may include multi-family units and homeowner associations).

**Areas irrigated by treated wastewater or reused water are exempt from these restrictions.

As a reminder, in an effort to protect our water quality, the use of fertilizers during rainy season (June 1 through September 30) is prohibited. Many commercial fertilizers contain nutrients, like nitrogen and phosphorus, which can become harmful runoff affecting water quality. Common fertilizers available at home improvement and lawn care stores most likely contain these ingredients and are subject to the ban. Residents and businesses should consider alternative landscaping options that do not present a threat to Jupiter's water quality (visit befloridiannow.org for more information). State of Florida Sales Tax Holidays

Disaster Preparedness August 26-September 8:

Consumers can purchase qualifying disaster preparedness supplies. Items included are portable generators for \$3,000 or less, tarps, portable kennels and batteries.

Freedom Summer Through September 4:

Consumers can purchase qualifying recreation and outdoor items as well as admissions to entertainment and cultural events. Items included are fishing supplies; camping supplies; sports equipment; boating and water activity supplies; children's toys; pool supplies; and general outdoor supplies.

Energy Star Appliances Through June 30, 2024:

Consumers can purchase clothes dryers, washing machines and water heaters priced \$1,500 or less; as well as refrigerators or combination refrigerator/freezers selling for \$4,500 or less.

Gas Ranges and Cooktops July 1-June 30, 2024:

This tax exemption applies to any gas range or cooktop fueled by combustible gas. This doesn't include outdoor gas grills, camping stoves or other portable stoves.

Home Hardening Through June 30, 2024:

Consumers can purchase impact-resistant doors, impact-resistant garage doors and impact-resistant windows.

Back-to-School July 24-August 6 and January 1-14:

Consumers can purchase clothing, footwear and certain accessories priced \$100 or less per item as well as certain school supplies priced \$50 or less.

Tool Time September 2-8:

Consumers can purchase qualifying items related to tools commonly used by skilled trade workers, with limits by category up to items priced at \$300 or less.

Ask the Expert: Free Chlorine Maintenance

The Town will be using free chlorination for roughly four weeks this summer. This is a temporary process that distributes free chlorine in place of combined chlorine (a mix of ammonia and chlorine) throughout the water distribution system to proactively disinfect the distribution system and prevent any bacteria growth. To learn more about the process and how it will influence residents and businesses, we asked Allyson Felsburg, Assistant Facilities Manager of the Town's Water Plant, some common questions.



What is free chlorine maintenance?

Free chlorine maintenance is a temporary disinfection process where the utility converts from using combined chlorine (chlorine and ammonia) to using just free chlorine.

Why is this performed?

Free chlorine is a slightly stronger disinfectant that is effective against resistant organisms that can exist in drinking water. The Town's Utilities Department does not have a problem with bacteria in the distribution system and has chosen to take a proactive approach to keep the Town's water mains clean and free of potentially harmful bacteria.

When will this happen?

This year's free chlorine maintenance will occur from Tuesday, August 22 to Tuesday, September 12.

Who will be affected?

Any resident or business receiving drinking water from the Town of Jupiter will experience this conversion. Some people may be more sensitive to the taste and smell of the chlorine in the water. While it may taste and smell stronger, there is actually less chlorine in the water than residents typically experience in the combined chlorine.

Is this maintenance safe?

Free chlorine is an approved disinfectant for drinking water and is safe to drink. This is a routine industry practice recommended by federal, state and local regulators. The addition of chlorine is closely monitored and maintained within a certain range required by the federal drinking water law. The maintenance program will include daily testing to monitor water quality. If you have concerns about your specific health needs, please consult your doctor.

Homestead Exemption Outreach Begins this September

September 13, October 11, November 8 and December 13

Floridians know that something unique about living in a state where so many people love to vacation is the Homestead Exemption filed for your property taxes.

Although this exemption only needs to be filed once for each property and will then carry over annually, it is important for first-time filers to know the requirements and deadlines for this tax exemption that can significantly reduce their property tax.

Staff from the Palm Beach County Property Appraiser's Office, Division of Education Services, will be on hand at the Jupiter Community Center throughout the fall to help residents submit their Homestead Exemption applications and answer any property valuation questions. The sessions will be held at the Jupiter Community Center from 1:30 to 2:30 pm on the second Wednesday of each month from September through December.

Applications for Homestead Exemptions are accepted by mail or in person at any time throughout the year, but in order for the exemption to be considered for the upcoming tax year, the application must be received by March 1 of the qualifying year.
