



Town Council and CRA Corner: Recent Policy Actions

Below is a summary of some of the approvals and decisions made by the Town Council and CRA Commission during recent meetings. Town Council

- **Sundstrom Named Vice Mayor:** Councilor Malise Sundstrom was named Vice Mayor for 2024-2025.
- **Sims Creek Open Space:** Town Council voted to accept a \$25,000 contribution from the Jupiter Inlet District for improvements to the Sims Creek Preserve and approved a grant between the Florida Department of Environmental Protection and the Town in the amount of \$100,000 for the Sims Creek Preserve. Town Council also approved a contract for no more than \$54,344.44 to the Wantman Group, Inc. for design services for public access and stormwater improvements at Sims Creek Preserve.
- **Railway Quiet Zones:** A Notice of Establishment of Quiet Zones, which informs the Federal Railway Administration (FRA) of the Town's desire to create a 24-hour quiet zone along the 4.72-mile railway corridor within the Town's boundaries, was approved. The FRA must review and approve the establishment of the quiet zone. It is important to note that while the establishment of a quiet zone eliminates the requirement for train horns to be blown at railway crossings, train conductors have the authority to use the horn at their discretion. This means that the number of times a train horn is heard within Jupiter is expected to be greatly reduced. Horns may still sound if necessary to maintain safe conditions.
- **Pine Gardens North Infrastructure Improvements:** Town Council approved the acceptance of a tender and settlement agreement with Developers Surety and Indemnity Company for a contract that was terminated due to a previous contractor being in default. Town Council also approved an agreement in the amount of \$3,159,000 with Gianetti Contracting Corporation, Inc. to complete the project.
- **Application for Rehearings:** Town Council approved a Town-initiated Zoning Text Amendment that clarifies the procedure for application withdrawal and restricts the submission of an application on a property in which a previous application has been denied.
- **Building Heights:** A Town-initiated Zoning Text Amendment that amends development standards in regard to height standards was approved. The change ensures enclosed rooftop mechanical rooms are exempt from height requirements in non-residential and mixed-use buildings only.
- **Annual Comprehensive Financial Report:** Marcum CPA firm provided a presentation concerning the Town's fiscal year 2023 Annual Comprehensive Financial Report. The Town received a clean audit showcasing its fiscal responsibility.
- **Medical Director of Fire and Rescue:** Town Council approved a contract award to Ferraro Emergency Medical Services, PLLC to serve in the role of Medical Director of Fire and Emergency Rescue. The initial three-year contract is for \$149,200.
- **Town Vulnerability Assessment:** Town Council accepted a grant agreement in the amount of \$259,838 with the Florida Department of Environmental Protection to complete a Town-wide comprehensive Vulnerability Assessment.

- **Police Vehicle Operations Training:** Town Council authorized the Chief of Police to execute a Facility Use Agreement in the amount of \$2,025 with St. Lucie County that allows the Police Department to conduct vehicle operations training.
- **Sulfuric Acid Pump System:** Town Council approved the purchase of a sulfuric acid dosing pump system for \$60,577 from Carl Eric Johnson, Inc. This system will replace the current pump and ensure safety for staff working with the pump.
- **Indiantown Road Widening:** A contract for no more than \$141,299.40 to Stanley Consultants to complete the concept design plans and preliminary cost estimates for the proposed widening of Indiantown Road from 67th Road North to Chasewood Plaza was approved.
- **Western Fire Station Location:** Town Council approved Town-owned land at Cinquez Park as the site of the western fire station for the Jupiter Fire Rescue Department. The station will be placed on the southwestern corner of the 13-acre park, on an area that was designated for future public purpose when the land was purchased. The historic Banyan Tree, walking trails, lake, open space areas, and the dog park areas will remain as important amenities and features in the park. Town Council also approved a work order in an amount not to exceed \$242,182.39 to Wantman Group for the design and construction package for the fire station.
- **Alma's Place Rezoning:** Town Council approved a Town-initiated Zoning Map Amendment to change the zoning of a Town-owned piece of property. The change reclassified the land from Residential, Single Family to Conservation Preservation District.
- **Stormwater Improvement Grant:** A private Stormwater Improvement Grant agreement with Egret Landing Property Owner's Association in an amount up to \$15,000 was approved.
- **Town Vehicles:** Town Council approved the purchase of three new vehicles, one Police vehicle in the amount of \$63,676 and two Public Works vehicles in the amount of \$234,780. Also approved was the purchase of three used Chevrolet Tahoes and related equipment for Fire Rescue from Jupiter Inlet Colony in the amount of \$113,339.

CRA

- **Mid-Year Budget Amendments:** The Commission approved a mid-year budget amendment for Fiscal Year 2024. The amendment carried forward unspent funds from Fiscal Year 2023 and appropriated funding for CIP projects such as the Events Plaza wall repairs, Love Street sidewalks and the design and engineering work for the Piatt Place park project.
- **CRA Love Street Parking:** The Commission approved a request by Jupiter Dive Center for the use of 24 daytime parking spaces within the CRA's parking lot.
- **CRA Annual Comprehensive Financial Report:** The Commission received a presentation from Marcum CPA firm on the CRA's fiscal year 2023 Annual Comprehensive Financial Report.

Deputy Fire Chief Stephen Shaw Sworn In, Reunites with Man He Saved

Deputy Fire Chief Stephen Shaw was sworn into office on April 24. A veteran firefighter with over 25 years of experience, he joins the Jupiter Fire Rescue Department (JFRD) after a long career with Fort Lauderdale Fire Rescue (FLFR), where he held various leadership roles.



A moment of fate made his transition to JFRD even more special. Michael Schneider, a Planning and Zoning employee, immediately recognized Stephen as the man who saved his life over a decade ago. Before the ceremony, Michael approached Stephen for a heartfelt reunion. When Michael asked if Stephen recognized him, Stephen's expression said it all.

The two met on September 23, 2013 when Michael was hit by a car on the Florida Turnpike in south Broward County. Stephen, who was off duty at the time, witnessed the accident, pulled out the trauma bag he kept in his vehicle at all times, and got to work. As Stephen approached, he saw that Michael wasn't breathing and his pulse was weak. He quickly began CPR and revived Michael. Michael was airlifted to Broward Health North and miraculously survived, in large part due to Stephen's quick response.



Public Budget Workshops and Hearings: Fiscal Year 2025

The Town of Jupiter's proposed budget for Fiscal Year 2025, which begins October 1, 2024, will be heard in two public Budget Hearings scheduled for Tuesday, September 3 and Thursday, September 19. Both hearings will be held at 7:00 pm at the Town Hall Council Chambers (210 Military Trail). Public Budget Workshops are held in advance of the public hearings. This year, the first workshop was held on Thursday, June 20 and the second is scheduled for Wednesday, August 14. Budget workshop and hearing dates are scheduled around other agencies' budget hearings, and therefore the Town's dates may change if they conflict. Parks and Rec Master Plan Update



The Town is working on a comprehensive Parks and Recreation Facilities Master Plan to improve indoor and outdoor recreational opportunities for both youth and adults in our community. This past spring, the Town collected resident input through a workshop as well as an online survey with 796 responses. The project consultant is now analyzing the results of the community input to create a proposed plan expected to be published this fall. Be Prepared this Hurricane Season

If this isn't your first hurricane season in Florida, you may have already stocked up on water, batteries and non-perishable foods. However, you may have missed some lesser-known tasks that should be on everyone's hurricane checklist.

Landscaping Check

It is important to properly prune trees and palms to help them withstand winds and to prevent limbs from becoming flying debris in a storm. Prune your trees regularly, but do not prune or landscape when a storm is approaching, since yard waste can become projectiles in the storm. Be aware that certain tree trimming services are offered at this time of year specifically for storm prep, but they often employ pruning methods that are a violation of Town Code and can, in fact, damage the tree. Be sure your landscape company uses a certified arborist for proper pruning. You can verify a credential or search for a local arborist at TreesAreGood.org. Follow Town Code for Safety

Some code violations can lead to safety issues if a storm hits. Below are tips from the Code Compliance Division to help make sure your structures are secure for hurricane season.

- Remove accumulated items from yards so they don't become flying debris in a storm.
- Finish home projects to make homes more secure before a storm hits. For example, repair loose or damaged areas of fencing, particularly where pools exist.
- Repair roofs, broken windows or doors to help maintain the structure's integrity.
- Use proper storm shutters or plywood installation. Taping windows for a storm is not safe or effective.

Storm Information

It is important to know where and how to receive information before, during and after a storm. In the event that Jupiter is impacted by a storm, residents should expect some Town services to remain suspended for three business days or more depending on the storm's severity. WM Trash Talk

It has been more than a year since the Town's waste disposal provider, Waste Management, introduced upgraded trash carts for automated trash collection. This summer, remember these easy tips for seamless usage:

- Make sure all trash bags are inside the garbage cart. *Bagged trash outside of the cart will not be picked up.*
- Bulk pick up is on the first collection day of the week.
- Ensure the wheels are facing your property.
- Keep the cart area clear of obstacles.

Homestead Exemption Outreach

September 11, October 9, November 13 December 11

Filing for the homestead exemption on property taxes is a benefit for Floridians. Although this exemption only needs to be filed once for each property and will then carry over annually, first-time filers need to know the requirements and deadlines for this tax exemption that can significantly reduce their property tax. Staff from the Palm Beach County Property Appraiser's Office will be on hand at the Jupiter Community Center throughout the fall to help residents submit their Homestead Exemption applications and answer any property valuation questions. The sessions will be held at the Jupiter Community Center from 1:30 to 2:30 pm on the second Wednesday of each month from September through December. Applications for Homestead Exemptions are accepted by mail or in person at any time throughout the year. However, for the exemption to be considered for the upcoming tax year, the application must be received by March 1 of the qualifying year. Visit jupiter.fl.us/Homestead for more information.

Free Chlorine Maintenance

The Town will undergo free chlorination maintenance from Tuesday, September 10 to Tuesday, October 1. This temporary process distributes free chlorine in place of combined chlorine (a mix of ammonia and chlorine) to proactively disinfect the distribution system and guard against bacterial growth.



Free chlorine is an approved disinfectant for drinking water and is safe to drink. This routine industry practice is recommended by federal, state and local regulators. The addition of chlorine is closely monitored and maintained within the safe range required by drinking water regulations. The maintenance program will include daily testing to monitor water quality. Residents may taste or smell chlorine in the water during the maintenance period. If you have concerns about your specific health needs, please consult your doctor.

Free Home Hurricane Inspection



The state's My Safe Florida Home program allows residents to get a free complete home hurricane inspection, detailing the strength of the home and recommended improvements. The program also offers grant money for residents for improvements including:

- Reinforcing roof to wall connectors
- Installing secondary water resistance for the roof
- Upgrading the roof covering
- Improving the strength of roof deck attachments
- Exterior door upgrades
- Garage door upgrades
- Window upgrades

The state grant is for a maximum amount of \$10,000, and the applicant's home must be located in a designated wind-borne region to qualify. Residents may be eligible to apply for a 50/50 match grant on eligible home strength improvements. Starting July 1, there were some qualification changes, so visit mysafehome.com for all program details. Participating in the program may also potentially lower the homeowner's insurance premiums.

Back to School Traffic Safety

Jupiter Police Department's "Slow Down in Our Town" campaign aims to educate and remind residents and visitors about the importance of driving at safe speeds throughout the Town. As school resumes on Monday, August 12, here are some easy safety tips to follow:

- Be aware of school zones and observe the yellow flashing school zone lights and speed limit signs.
- Do not pass a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children.
- Always stop when directed to do so by an officer or a school crossing guard.
- Do not block crosswalks and watch for kids walking and biking through crosswalks.
- Stay alert while driving, and don't text and drive.

Mail-In-Ballot Must Be Requested After Every General Election Cycle



Voters who wish to receive a vote-by-mail ballot for the 2024 elections are required to complete a new vote-by-mail ballot request under Florida's new election law. Updated vote-by-mail requests will be valid until December 31, 2024. After the next general election, voters will need to make the request again, and it will need to be renewed after every general election cycle for future elections.

State of Florida Sales Tax Holidays

Disaster Preparedness: August 24-September 6
Consumers can purchase qualifying disaster preparedness supplies. Items included are portable generators for \$3,000 or less, tarps, portable kennels and batteries.

Freedom Month: Through July 31
Consumers can purchase qualifying recreation and outdoor items as well as admissions to entertainment and cultural events. Items included are fishing supplies; camping supplies; sports equipment; boating and water activity supplies; children's toys; pool supplies; and general outdoor supplies.

Back-to-School: July 29-August 11
Consumers can purchase clothing, footwear and certain accessories priced \$100 or less per item as well as certain school supplies priced \$50 or less.

Tool Time: September 1-7
Consumers can purchase qualifying items related to tools commonly used by skilled trade workers, with limits by category of \$300 or less.



Help Protect Local Water Resources

Help protect Jupiter's precious natural water resources including the Loxahatchee River, Sims Creek, Jones Creek, and the surficial aquifer by being a good steward of the environment. Practice water conservation by following the irrigation guidelines in the Town's code, established to protect and sustain Jupiter's water supply and surface water natural resources.

Irrigation Days and Times for Residential, Commercial, Industrial, Institutional and Governmental Properties

Odd-numbered addresses	Mondays, Wednesdays, and/or Saturdays 4:00 pm - 10:00 am
Even-numbered addresses*	Tuesdays, Thursdays, and/or Sundays 4:00 pm - 10:00 am

*Even and odd addresses irrigated on the same systems/zones should be watered on the days for even-numbered addresses (this may include multi-family units and homeowner associations).

**Areas irrigated by treated wastewater or reuse water are exempt from these restrictions.

As a reminder, in an effort to protect the Town's surface water quality, the use of fertilizers during rainy season (June 1 through September 30) is prohibited. Many commercial fertilizers contain nutrients, like nitrogen and phosphorus, which can become harmful stormwater runoff affecting water quality. Common fertilizers available at home improvement and lawn care stores most likely contain these ingredients and are subject to the ban. Residents and businesses should consider alternative fertilizers or "Florida-friendly" landscaping options that do not present a threat to Jupiter's natural water resources (visit befloridiannow.org for more information). Ask the Expert: Water Service Line Identification Program

The Town of Jupiter's Water Service Line Identification Program was created to comply with new requirements outlined in the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency's (EPA) Lead and Copper Rule, which requires the Town's Utilities Department to identify and share publicly the material of all water lines within its water system. Jupiter's water customers can visit jupiter.fl.us/ServiceLines to learn more about the program and track its progress. We spoke to Utilities staff to learn more about this program and how it will impact the Town's water customers.

1. What is a water service line?

A service line is the underground pipe that connects your home to the water main, delivering water to faucets, bathtubs, showers and other water outlets inside the home.

2. What is the Lead and Copper Rule?

The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) passed a federal regulation in 1991 known as the Lead and Copper Rule (LCR), which requires drinking water utilities to provide corrosion control and monitor for lead in drinking water supplied to customers' homes. If high lead levels are detected in the drinking water, then a utility must implement changes to improve corrosion control and reduce lead levels. The Town of Jupiter's Utilities Department has maintained consistent compliance with the LCR since the rule was established. Recently, the LCR was revised, and regulation requirements were added. The Town is actively working to implement these new requirements that will go into effect in October.

3. What are the new requirements for water utilities with the Lead and Copper Rule Revision (LCRR)?

The Town has created a Water Service Line Identification Program to address the LCRR requirements. The compliance deadline for the revised rule is October 2024, and all utilities, regardless of their history of compliance with the original LCR, must make changes as required by the revised rule. These changes include:

- Develop a publicly accessible water service line inventory.
- Submit a lead service line (LSL) replacement plan.
- Update their lead and copper sample plan.
- Implement a lead testing program in schools and childcare facilities.

4. What is the Town doing to comply with the new requirements?

First, the Town does not currently have any known lead service lines. Staff is out in the community now doing a service line inventory on all the service lines that still need to be identified in order to complete the Town's service line inventory. Jupiter Fire Rescue Department (JFRD) Update

In May, the Town Council approved Cinquez Park as the location for the new western fire station for the Jupiter Fire Rescue Department. The station will be situated at the southwestern corner of the 13-acre Cinquez Park. The park's historic Banyan Tree, walking trails, lake, open space areas and dog park will remain and continue to be enjoyed by the community.

Wantman Group is handling the design and construction package for both this station as well as the east Jupiter station, which was approved for Piatt Place located off of U.S. 1 across from the River Center. This step ensures that the project will continue to progress smoothly, with a focus on meeting the community's needs and safety requirements.

Apply for a Stormwater Grant Today

Apply today for the Town's Stormwater Improvement Grant Program. This program provides financial assistance to homeowner associations and other private entities, including commercial properties, to fund projects that improve the water quality discharging from private stormwater management systems, provide erosion control or help minimize flooding. The Town will match up to 50% of a project's cost. Associations and private entities interested in this program can apply at jupiter.fl.us/StormwaterGrant.

Applications can also be mailed to the Town of Jupiter Utilities, 17403 Central Boulevard, Jupiter, FL 33458, or submitted via e-mail to stormwater@jupiter.fl.us.

A committee will review all applications received and make awards based on the benefit to the regional stormwater system. Proposals should only include projects that reduce existing flooding and/or produce benefits to water quality. Routine maintenance tasks are not eligible for funding.
