



### Town Council and CRA Corner: Recent Policy Actions

Below is a summary of some of the approvals and decisions made by the Town Council and CRA Commission during recent meetings. #### Town Council

- **Cinquez Park Future Land Use Map Amendment:** Town Council approved an amendment to the Comprehensive Plan Future Land Use map for a 3-acre portion of Town-owned property. This amendment will change the Future Land Use designation from Recreation to Public/Institutional, to align with the property's zoning designation of Public/Institutional.
- **Jupiter Fire Rescue Fire Stations:** Earlier this summer, the Town Council approved the site plans and special exceptions for constructing two new two-story fire stations for the Jupiter Fire Rescue Department. These stations will be located at Piatt Place on U.S. 1 and adjacent to Cinquez Park on Indiantown Road. Additionally, Town Council unanimously approved a short-term financial agreement of up to \$20 million utilizing the Florida Local Government Finance Commission's Pooled Commercial Paper Loan Program to fund the construction of the Town's two new fire stations. This program offers lower interest rates than are available on current bank loans, which will save the Town of Jupiter approximately \$1 million over the next two years. In August, the Town Council unanimously approved a design-build contract with Kaufman Lynn Construction for \$4,917,970. This contract encompasses the final design of the fire stations. It also covers the demolition of the underground parking structure and site preparation at Piatt Place.
- **Construction Easement:** Town Council approved a temporary construction easement agreement with Johnson Bros. Corporation for the use of a portion of the Lighthouse Park property for construction trailers and lay down, and authorizing staff to issue a letter to Johnson Bros. Corporation to terminate the current temporary construction easement agreement at Piatt Place.
- **Community Development Block Grant:** Town Council approved the Town's 2024-2025 Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Action Plan for \$273,367. The funds will be used to address drainage issues on North Pennock Lane.
- **Water Pointe Replat:** Town Council approved the replat of approximately 4.2 acres of land located on the west side of U.S. 1, just south of Indiantown Road. The replat will create two tracts from a current single tract. One of the new tracts will be for the Water Pointe residential development and the other will be dedicated to the Town for the Jupiter Riverwalk.
- **Sipowski Replat:** Town Council approved the replat of approximately 0.9 acres of land located on the north side of Old Jupiter Beach Road just east of Alternate A1A. The replat is for three lots, two of which are currently platted and one that isn't, and will establish a drainage easement for the three lots.
- **Bears Club Cottage Replat:** Town Council approved the replat of approximately 1.4 acres of land located north of Donald Ross Road and east of Alternate A1A within the Bear's Club development. The replat will change the geometry of two current lots for the development of three duplexes and the Clubhouse Fitness Center.
- **Town Hall Demolition and Green Space:** Town Council approved a contract for no more than \$3,046,124 with Person Services Corporation for the demolition of the old Town Hall and Police Department Building and the creation of a Town Green.

- **FY25 Operating Budget, CIP Budget and Millage Rate:** Town Council approved the fiscal year 2025 millage rate, operating budget and five-year Community Investment Program (*See article to the right*).
- **Clay Tennis Court Fence:** Town Council approved a contract for no more than \$249,300 with E&F Florida Enterprises to replace the fence at the Abacoa Community Park clay tennis courts.
- **Collector Roadway Lighting:** Town Council approved renewing a contract for no more than \$295,931.60 with Lazarus Group to install underground/under pavement electrical along various roadways within the Town. This work supports future installation of street lighting by Florida Power and Light Company (FPL).
- **Police Vehicles:** Town Council approved the use of forfeiture funds to purchase two trucks and associated equipment in an amount not to exceed \$137,369.
- **Florida Water Professionals Month:** Town Council recognized August as Florida Water Professionals Month.
- **Cybersecurity:** Town Council approved renewing the annual license for Sentinel One Endpoint Protection and Response Cybersecurity Platform for \$57,302.01. These platforms are used to protect staff workstations and the Town's server.
- **Trash Pick-Up Route Discussion:** Town Council agreed to Waste Management's request to eliminate Saturday pickups and transition to a five-day pickup schedule. WM will communicate updated trash pick-up days, which will be implemented this fall, to residents this fall.
- **Bush Road Infrastructure Improvements:** Town Council approved a contract with Johnson-Davis for an amount not to exceed \$2,061,900 for drainage and watermain improvements in Pennock Industrial Park and on Bush Road.
- **Shoreline Stabilization and Living Shoreline Improvements:** Town Council approved a contract with Underwater Engineering Services for an amount not to exceed \$258,326 for the installation of shoreline stabilization and living shoreline improvements at Sawfish Bay Park.
- **Fire-Rescue Services MSTU:** Town Council approved the inclusion of the Town of Jupiter into the Jupiter-Municipal Service Taxing Unit (MSTU) for fire-rescue services provided by Palm Beach County Fire Rescue for the coming calendar year.
- **Shaved Ice Trailer:** Town Council approved using \$46,585 from federal forfeiture funds to purchase and equip a fully operational shaved ice trailer to be used at public safety community outreach events.

#### CRA Commission

- **FY24 Operating and CIP Budget Amendment:** The CRA Commission approved adjusting the 2024 fiscal year operating budget. The adjustments will fund the CRA portion of the demolition and backfill of the underground parking facility at Piatt Place and the CRA portion of the Jupiter Beach Road roundabout.
- **FY25 Operating Budget and CIP:** The CRA Commission approved the 2025 fiscal year CRA operating budget and the CRA's five-year Community Investment Program (CIP).

### Town Green Coming Spring 2025

### Town and CRA Adopt Millage Rates, Operating Budgets and Five-Year Community Investment Programs (CIP)

**Fiscal year 2025 begins October 1, 2024, and ends September 30, 2025**

On Wednesday, September 18, the Town Council adopted the millage rate, operating budget and pay plan for fiscal year 2025 (FY2025), and the five-year Community Investment Program (CIP) for fiscal years 2025-29. The millage rate for FY2025 is 2.3894, not including debt; including voter-approved debt service, the total millage rate for FY2025 is 2.4748. The FY2025 millage rate, which is stated in terms of dollars per \$1,000 of taxable property value, is 0.0476 mills less than the combined rate for FY2024. The FY2025 operating budget and pay plan for all Town of Jupiter funds for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2025 totals \$147.7 million including debt service funds. This represents a \$13 million increase from the prior fiscal year, which had an approved budget of \$134.6 million. The FY2025-2029 five-year CIP expenditures total \$97.8 million, compared to \$83.4 million for fiscal years 2024-2028.

On September 3, the Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) Commission adopted the FY2025 operating budget and five-year CIP for the CRA. The CRA operating budget for FY2025 totals \$4.1 million, an increase of approximately \$900,000 compared to FY2024. The five-year CRA CIP for FY2025-2029 totals \$4.6 million.

### Water and Stormwater Rates Increase Beginning October 1

On September 3, the Town Council approved a three percent increase to water rates and a seven percent increase to stormwater fees. The increase takes effect on Tuesday, October 1. With this adjustment, the average customer's water bill will increase from \$42.77 to \$44.08 per month and the typical customer's monthly stormwater fee will increase from \$7.06 to \$7.55. ## Jupiter Fire Rescue Department (JFRD) Update

Starting October 1, 2026, the JFRD will begin serving Jupiter residents. As the department works towards that start date, the Town will provide updates in this section of the Town Times. ## Jupiter Fire Stations

In July, Town Council unanimously approved the site plans for two brand new, state-of-the-art fire stations, to be located on Town-owned property adjacent to Cinquez Park on Indiantown Road and Piatt Place on U.S. 1. A design-build contract with Kaufman Lynn Construction for \$4,917,970 for the final design of two new fire stations as well as the demolition of the underground parking structure and site preparation at Piatt Place was approved by the council in August. These two new stations will be in addition to the third station located off Military Trail that will be transferred from Palm Beach County Fire Rescue to Jupiter Fire Rescue Department when JFRD begins servicing the area on October 1, 2026.

The stations are located and designed to provide response times and house resources that will provide excellent levels of service for the entire Jupiter community. In addition, the site plans incorporate landscaping, park features and natural environments that are the result of the surrounding neighborhoods' inputs.

The station adjacent to Cinquez Park station is located on the southwest corner of the park to provide separation from the popular ficus tree (known as the "Banyan Tree") as well as from the dog park. The tree, the dog park and the park's walking trail and lake will remain untouched as the station is constructed. Based on resident feedback, the site plan changes also addressed parking concerns, landscaping enhancements and neighborhood impacts.

To fund the stations, the Town Council approved the use of surtax funds for the demolition and initial phases of the project. The Town will also use a short-term financial agreement of up to \$20 million utilizing the Florida Local Government Finance Commission's Pooled Commercial Paper Loan Program to fund the construction. This program offers reduced interest costs and fees compared to traditional current bank loans, which will save the Town of Jupiter approximately \$1 million over the next two years.



## Public Access Defibrillators Now Available in Six Town Parks

In early September, 11 AEDs were placed in six Town parks so that residents have access to the life-saving tool if a cardiac emergency happened. These AEDs were strategically placed in parks where both adult and youth athletics are hosted to ensure timely assistance during emergencies. The AEDs are located at:

- Jupiter Village Park
- Maplewood Park
- Cinquez Park
- Lighthouse Park
- Jupiter Community Park
- Abacoa Community Park

In an emergency, residents call 911 and receive a code from the operator to access the AED, and the machine walks the user through its use. JFRD coordinated the installation of these AEDs to increase the survival rate for individuals experiencing cardiac emergencies by empowering residents to take action.

## Rescue Rings Installed at Four Town Parks to Prevent Drownings

Four Town parks now have life preserver rings strategically placed near bodies of water to assist in water-related emergencies. The life rings are placed at Cinquez Park, Indian Creek Park, Jupiter Community Park and Sawfish Bay Park. The Town partnered with the Aden Perry Foundation to install the rings and is the first municipality in Palm Beach County to have them.



Aden Perry tragically lost his life while attempting to save someone who had accidentally driven into a neighborhood lake. In his memory, his mother, Sarah Perry, is spearheading the installation of life rings around bodies of water in South Florida to help save lives while minimizing the risk to rescuers. These life rings provide a way to assist without requiring the rescuer to enter the water.

## Flashing Pedestrian Crossings Installed Outside Two Elementary Schools

Two new flashing pedestrian crosswalks were installed in August, one on Dakota Drive near Lighthouse Elementary School and the other on Loxahatchee Drive near Jupiter Elementary School. These crosswalks are designed to make it safer for children to walk to school and are just the beginning—10 more crosswalks will be improved in the coming months to enhance pedestrian safety across Town.



The new crosswalks feature button-activated lights to alert drivers when pedestrians are crossing. The Town collaborated closely with the principals of both elementary schools to select the best locations for these crosswalks. 

## Homestead Exemption Outreach

Staff from the Palm Beach County Property Appraiser's Office will be on hand at the Jupiter Community Center monthly through December to help residents submit their homestead exemption applications and answer any property valuation questions. The sessions will be held the second Wednesday of each month from 1:30 to 2:30 pm. Applications for homestead exemptions are accepted by mail or in person at any time throughout the year. However, for the exemption to be considered for the upcoming tax year, the application must be received by March 1 of the qualifying year. ## Water Service Line Inventory Complete

In the last year, Town staff conducted and completed an inventory of all water service lines in the Town to comply with the recent Lead and Copper Rule Revisions (LCRR). The revisions added new requirements for water utilities to identify water service construction materials on both the utility side and the customer side of a water meter. The inventory was completed in early September and there were no lead lines found. The service line material inventory will be published on the Town's website along with educational material by Wednesday, October 16.

The Lead and Copper Rule was established by the Environmental Protection Agency in 1991. The original rule was created to regulate and reduce consumer exposure to lead and copper through drinking water. ## JPD Officers Recognized with Lifesaving Award


The Jupiter Police Department has demonstrated remarkable heroism in recent months, with officers performing life-saving actions in critical situations.

In June, Officers Christopher Morgan and Ian Fries responded to an emergency where someone had collapsed and was not breathing. They administered CPR and used an AED device, which revived the individual and allowed for their transport to the hospital in stable condition.

Similarly, on July 4, Officers Cory Hamilton and Michael Denier swiftly responded to a stabbing incident. Their prompt intervention to stop the bleeding before paramedics arrived was crucial in preventing further hemorrhaging and played a key role in saving a life.

These incidents are just two examples of the Jupiter Police Department's commitment to protecting and saving lives through their brave and swift actions.

### A1A and Jupiter Beach Road Roundabout

The new roundabout at Jupiter Beach Road and A1A is expected to be completed by the mid-October. The roundabout will help the flow of traffic at the intersection, and will also include installing lighting and three crosswalks to allow pedestrians to cross Jupiter Beach Road and A1A. As you use the roundabout, remember to:

- Yield to vehicles already circulating in the roundabout.
- Reduce your speed when entering and navigating the roundabout.
- Avoid stopping while in the roundabout.

### Cypress Drive Drainage Improvements Help Prevent Area Flooding

This past summer, significant drainage improvements were completed along Cypress Drive to reduce roadway flooding. The project included the installation of approximately 480 feet of concrete valley gutters designed to direct stormwater runoff.



Additionally, 280 feet of new drainage pipe and three new drainage structures were installed.

To improve water quality, two grassed detention areas were created. These areas allow stormwater to settle, improving the quality of runoff before it discharges into the Loxahatchee River. This enhancement supports the Loxahatchee River Pollutant Reduction Plan and helps alleviate routine flooding in the area.

### Proposed CRA Plan Heard at September Workshop

At the September 11 Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) Workshop, the CRA Commission reviewed a draft 2024 CRA Plan Amendment to update the existing CRA Plan from 2012. The discussion focused on updating the CRA's goals, priorities and potential projects.

The proposed updates were developed based on public input collected from meetings, stakeholder sessions and focus groups held earlier this spring. During the workshop, the CRA Commission provided feedback on the proposed plan. The plan will be refined and is scheduled to be presented to the CRA Commission for adoption on Tuesday, December 17.

### Town of Jupiter Elections Tuesday, March 11
