

Why “Jupiter”

Most historians agree that the name “Jupiter” had its origin during the time the British controlled Florida (1763 – 1783). Spain had ceded Florida to Britain, and when the British examined the Spanish maps for this area, they noted Rio Jobe as the local river. It is believed that the Spanish named the area “Jobe” after the native residents, the Jobe – pronounced “ho-bay” – Indians (by the way, this is where Hobe Sound got its name). For the British, “Jobe” became “Jove” (the Roman name for Zeus), which was then anglicized to “Jupiter.” Later, during the American period, neighboring Juno was named as such since according to Greek mythology, she was Jupiter’s consort. South Florida’s first rail line, the Jupiter and Lake Worth Railway, would become known as the Celestial Railroad due to the stops along the way between Jupiter and Juno named Venus, Mars and Neptune.

2023 & 2024 Budgets at a Glance

General Fund:

Used to maintain the general operations of the Town's government and municipal services. This includes funding most Town departments like law enforcement and public works as well as Town events and recreation activities. Revenues are generated primarily from property taxes.

Fire Fund: Used to maintain and track the annual implementation funding and expenses of the Town's new fire rescue department. During implementation, funds are derived from annual appropriations from the Town's general reserves to cover first year costs. This fund is part of the General Fund.

Health Insurance Fund: Used to fund the Town's partially self-insured health insurance program. Funds are generated from premiums collected.

Building Fund: Enterprise fund used to operate the building department. Revenues are generated from charges for services and permit fees.

Debt Service Fund: Used to manage debts from bond issues and large capital projects.

Water Fund: Enterprise fund used to operate the water utility. Revenues are generated primarily from water sales and connection fees.

Stormwater Fund: Enterprise fund used to operate the stormwater utility. Revenues are generated from charges for services.


Capital Improvements Fund: Used to fund large capital improvement projects in the Town. Funds are generated from property taxes, and impact and developer fees.

Each year, the Town takes a thoughtful approach to budgeting in order to efficiently provide services to its residents and make progress on its strategic plan. The Town's fiscal year runs from October 1 through September 30, and the Town's annual budget is approved in September every year. The Town has eight funds that make up the annual budget for the Town. The largest of these funds is the general fund, which supports the general operations of the Town.

Across all funds, the Town budgeted \$126.4 million in FY2023 (October 1, 2022 to September 30, 2023). In FY2024, the budgeted – or planned – expenditure for all funds is \$134.6 million. For a snapshot at how Town funds were allocated in FY2023 as well as how the FY2024 total budget is allocated by fund, see the infographic below.

On the left is a list of the funds with a brief description of each to explain what the fund covers, and where the revenues for each fund originate.

- Total **FY2025** actual expenditures for all funds were **\$147.7 million***
- Total **FY2024** budgeted expenditures for all funds are **\$134.6 million**



Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) Budget

The CRA in Jupiter was created in 2003 and manages the area along the coastal and Intracoastal waterways from Inlet Village south to Coastal Way, including the Riverwalk. The CRA has its own operating and capital improvement budget. Revenues are generated from incremental property taxes, and those revenues must be spent within the CRA boundaries. TOWN CODE

The Town of Jupiter is governed by a municipal code that contains the Town’s charter, as well as things like administrative regulations, land development regulations, building regulations, zoning requirements, etc. The code is amended through the Town Council’s legislative process, and enforced by the Town through the Code Compliance Division and the Jupiter Police Department. CODE COMPLIANCE DIVISION

The Town’s Code Compliance Division plays an important role in preserving the standards of housing, safety, sanitation, and other elements established for our community. The Division works in partnership with residents and businesses to promote and maintain a safe and desirable environment within the Town, as well as to provide information and educational programs intended to improve the standards of the community and enhance property values.

Frequent Code Violations — jupiter.fl.us/Code

The following are violations that the Code Compliance team addresses frequently throughout Jupiter. Some of these situations may end up applying to you, so please be mindful of these regulations as you go about your daily activities.



Prohibited Signs

These include portable signs, pennants, A-frames, balloons, streamers, animated signs, roof and window signs, and painted wall signs. All legal signage requires a permit.



Mowing & Landscape Maintenance

Grass and weeds can not exceed 8 inches in height for residential areas, 6 inches for commercial areas and 12 inches for vacant lots.



Illegal Parking

Boats, campers and trailers must be stored in the side yard or in the back yard. Commercial vehicles are not permitted to be parked in a residential area for more than one hour, unless actively loading or unloading.



Illegal Accumulation, Disposal & Dumping

The accumulation and disposal of abandoned property, debris, and waste products on public or private land is not permitted.

Residential Building Permits

Thinking of renovating? Building permits are required for most work on residential buildings and structures including single family homes, duplexes, triplexes, townhomes, condominiums, apartments, villas, and mobile homes.

- Shutter and impact window install
- Siding exterior veneers

WASTE AND RECYCLING

The Town of Jupiter takes pride in its appearance. For that reason, household and yard waste are collected twice a week by Waste Management. There is no service provided on Thanksgiving day and Christmas day. Below are some tips and information about how household waste and recycling are handled in the Town. For more information or to find out your particular collection schedule, visit jupiter.fl.us/Garbage or call Waste Management at 800-824-8472.

Household and Yard Waste — jupiter.fl.us/Garbage

Regular household and yard waste is collected by Waste Management twice a week in Jupiter. Starting March 1, 2023 residents must put all household waste in the carts provided by Waste Management. All trash will be required fit inside of the trash cart for pickup. For each pickup, up to eight cubic yards of vegetative waste, enough to roughly fill a small dumpster, can be picked up. All large waste piles larger than 8 cubic yards will be collected within two days of your regular scheduled collection day. Household and yard waste must be curbside by 7:00 am on collection days. Bulk items such as major appliances and furniture will be collected weekly on the first pick up day of the week for your regular household garbage collection.



Clippings / Leaves

Place yard waste such as grass clippings, leaves and small twigs in sturdy tied plastic bags or a 32-gallon can. Do not exceed 50 pounds in weight.



Branches / Limbs

Ensure branches, limbs and palm fronds are tied and bundled. Do not exceed 6 feet in length.

Recycling — jupiter.fl.us/Garbage

Recycling at home is a way the Town's residents can do their part to preserve natural resources. Recycling collection will be picked up once a week and will need to be put curbside by 7:00 am on collection day. Be sure to clean food residue off items before recycling. Some common items that aren't recyclable are plastic bags, clamshell packaging, plastic utensils, napkins, paper towels, shredded paper, paper cups, paper plates, polystyrene hot/cold cups and containers, hoses, propane tanks, plastic and metal clothes hangers, mirror and paint. Below are the basics of what recycle products go in what bin. The Solid Waste Authority provides and delivers new and replacement recycle bins for the Town of Jupiter residents free of charge. They can be contacted by calling (866) 639-2467.



Recycle in Yellow Bin

Paper and cardboard including newspapers, magazines, catalogs and flattened cardboard boxes. Flattened boxes can't exceed 3 feet by 3 feet.



Recycle in Blue Bin

Glass bottles and jars without lids or caps, plastic containers like milk and juice cartons, aluminum cans, pie plates and foil.

The Town has been in partnership with the Solid Waste Authority of Palm Beach County (SWA) since the early 1990s when SWA began a county-wide recycling program. In 2010, the Town reinforced that partnership through an interlocal agreement to be part of the SWA Recycling Revenue Share program. Since then, the Town has recycled more than 34,280 tons of blue and yellow bin recyclables for a revenue share return of more than \$742,000, which goes back into the Town's general fund.

Recycle Tip

Today, most things are recyclable - but not everything! Palm Beach County has a two bin recycling program with a list of the recyclable items printed on the side of the bins. A complete list of what items go in which bin is on SWA's website.



Hazardous Waste

No paint cans, pesticides, pool chemicals, engine oil, tires, auto parts or demolition debris should be put in the trash.

For information on how to dispose of household hazardous waste, please contact the Solid Waste Authority at 561-697-2700 or drop off at the transfer station located at 14185 North Military Trail, Jupiter.

Utility Bill

Your monthly utilities bill from the Town includes both stormwater and waste pick up.

PROPER TREE PRUNING

Natural Resources — jupiter.fl.us/NaturalResources

Florida and palms go hand-in-hand. It's important to properly care for these signature plants in order to maintain a healthy ecosystem. Jupiter requires that all palms be pruned according to specific guidelines (detailed in Town Code, Chapter 23 - Landscaping). The over-pruning of palms is a common problem in our community, but proper pruning is simple. Both property owners and landscape management companies have a responsibility to ensure that proper pruning occurs. If you hire an individual or a company to prune your palms, be sure to provide a copy of the Town's proper pruning guide (found online at jupiter.fl.us/NaturalResources) to them. Remember, you as a property owner are also responsible for the work performed and may be cited with a code violation if the work is improper. The Town of Jupiter's staff is available as a resource for residents and businesses by calling **561-741-2323**.

Trimming Mangroves in Jupiter

In order to trim mangroves on your property, you will need a permit from the Florida Department of Environmental Protection or a certified mangrove trimmer to trim the mangroves. This is regulated by State of Florida Department of Environmental Protection. Contact them at **561-681-6600**.

WATER & STORMWATER UTILITIES

In 1978, the Town of Jupiter purchased the water system from Tri-Southern Utilities, which was then producing an average daily flow of 2.5 million gallons for 1,500 people.

Today, the water utility is capable of producing 30 million gallons a day of ultra-pure drinking water, and serves more than 86,000 people living in the Jupiter area.



In 1990, Jupiter Utilities researched the most advanced water systems in the country to formulate a safer, more environmentally-friendly water utility. The result was the creation of a reverse osmosis (RO) program, which stands as one of the largest brackish water desalination programs in the country. The water plant is capable of producing over 70 percent of its current average daily supply by desalination.

The Town's Utilities has also implemented the nanofiltration treatment which replaced the older conventional lime softening water treatment facility. Nanofiltration, utilizes advanced membrane treatment technology to remove undesirable dissolved constituents from the groundwater. It's considered the ultimate barrier against virus and bacteria found in raw water.

Over the past two decades, the Town's water utility has been honored with 40 awards for excellence in operations, treatment and drinking water.

Ban on Rainy Season Application of Fertilizers

In October 2018, the Jupiter Town Council passed an ordinance prohibiting the use of fertilizers during Jupiter's rainy season (June 1 through September 30). The Town works with landscape and lawn care businesses that operate in the Town to ensure that these businesses are aware of the new ordinance, but it also applies to residents who maintain their own lawns. The ban stems from certain nutrients (nitrogen and phosphorus) that are typically used in commercial fertilizers that can become harmful runoff detrimental to local water quality. Common fertilizers available at home improvement and lawn care stores most likely contain the harmful ingredients and are subject to the ban. However, there are alternative fertilizers that can be used without the risk of harmful runoff. For a list of acceptable fertilizers, please visit www.befloridiannow.org. Loxahatchee River District Sewer & Irrigation

The Loxahatchee River District (LRD) is an Independent Special District created by the Florida Legislature in 1971 that handles the Town's sewer. It is governed by a five-member, publicly elected Governing Board. LRD operates an award-winning facility that collects wastewater from the community and recycles it for irrigation needs, preserving fresh water supplies for the environment. JUPITER PUBLIC SAFETY

The Town of Jupiter places a high value on safety and is committed to ensuring its Public Safety departments work together to set the standard for excellence. The Jupiter Fire Rescue Department has already collaborated closely with the Jupiter Police Department on community outreach initiatives, and when JFRD begins providing service on October 1, 2026, they will join forces with JPD in a united effort to protect and serve the community. Together, these departments will ensure that Jupiter continues to lead in public safety, with a shared commitment to the well-being of all residents.

Jupiter Fire Rescue Department (JFRD)

Starting October 1, 2026, the JFRD will begin serving Jupiter residents. Residents can stay up to date with JFRD news and developments by visiting jupiter.fl.us/FireRescue or by following JFRD on Facebook @JupiterFireRescue.



The Jupiter Fire Rescue Department (JFRD) will begin serving the community on October 1, 2026, and will set the benchmark for service delivery on day one.

This new department was created so Town Council could make fiscally responsible decisions for Jupiter’s residents and businesses. JFRD will significantly reducing the cost of fire rescue and emergency services compared to the charges from existing costs.

The Town of Jupiter has long fostered a culture of excellence in public safety, a standard set by the Jupiter Police Department every day. JFRD will carry that tradition forward, starting with a commitment to excellence from day one.

JFRD has already been actively engaging with the community to promote fire safety and emergency preparedness. This includes Canine Care Workshops, AEDs in Town parks, Life Rings in parks with bodies of water and safety education at local schools.

Jupiter Police Department (JPD)

With 109 sworn officers and 34 civilian staff members, the Jupiter Police Department is organized into three bureaus: Operations Support, Patrol, and Administrative Services, each with specialized divisions and units.

The department offers various community programs, including the Citizen Police Academy, Junior Police Academy, Coffee with a Cop, bicycle safety rodeos and more.

Internationally accredited by CALEA and state accredited by CFA, the department is committed to maintaining the highest standards of policing and providing exceptional service to all residents, business owners and visitors.



- In the first text message, send the location and type of emergency.
- Send a short text message without abbreviations or slang.

HURRICANE, FLOOD, & STORM PREPARATION

Hurricane season begins June 1. Being prepared is the best strategy.

Hurricanes are a part of life in our coastal community. Hurricane season, which runs from June 1 to November 30, is something all Floridians should be prepared for.

While hurricanes may not directly hit our area, severe weather may still impact us in the form of a tropical depression or tropical storm. Every homeowner and business owner should prepare for these events that may cause local erosion, flooding, wind damage and possible tornadoes.

Similarly, the Town hopes for the best and prepares for the worst in its storm and severe weather preparations. Town staff works year-round to ensure the safety of residents and local resources.

DOING BUSINESS IN JUPITER

Businesses in the Town of Jupiter will no longer be required to apply for or renew their business licenses with the Town. On August 17, 2021 the Jupiter Town Council passed Ordinance 14-21, repealing Town of Jupiter Business Tax Receipts (BTR).

Palm Beach County Local Business Tax Receipts will still be required of all current and new businesses and professionals in the Town of Jupiter. Existing businesses should renew with the County by September 30 and new businesses should submit applications via the Palm Beach County Tax Collectors Office website.

In addition, the Town of Jupiter will no longer require business operators to obtain Town approvals for the zoning portion (section #2) of their Palm Beach County Business Tax Receipts. However, all businesses still must adhere to the Town's Lands Development Regulations, site specific development order conditions and other applicable requirements. All business owners must still adhere to any County requirements for Business Tax Receipts.

Jupiter Beaches – jupiter.fl.us/Beaches

Jupiter has approximately 3.4 miles of beautiful beaches along its coastline. Here, the Gulf Stream flows nearest to the United States with its warm current keeping the ocean at a comfortable 78 degrees on average throughout the year. Jupiter’s beaches are known for their warm, clear waters and shores that are enveloped by the natural features of the area, such as dunes, mangroves and sea grape trees. In addition to maintenance by the County and Town, Friends of Jupiter Beach, a local non-profit group, helps to keep the beaches clean and protect these natural resources that are enjoyed by residents and tourists alike. Friends of Jupiter Beach is essential to maintaining the local dog beaches.

We are proud to say that Jupiter is home to one of the few remaining dog-friendly beaches in the state of Florida. In 1989, Jupiter’s Town Council adopted a policy to allow dogs on Jupiter’s beaches. In the time since then, the dog-friendly beach areas have been defined as a 2.5 mile stretch of beach from beach marker #25 at Marcinski Road going north to beach marker #59 on the south end of Carlin Park. In order to preserve this amenity, there are some rules that should be followed when visiting Jupiter’s dog-friendly beach areas. Owners must supervise their dogs at all times while at the beach, pick up any dog waste (bags are available at the beaches) and dogs should be leashed while walking from the car to the beach. 

RIVERWALK

The Riverwalk is a recreational multi-use pathway that runs primarily along the eastern shoreline of the intracoastal waterway from the Jupiter Ridge Natural Area north to the Jupiter Inlet. Upon completion, the Jupiter Riverwalk will, via a multi-use ADA compliant trail, provide public access to approximately 2.5 miles of the Intracoastal Waterway and the Jupiter Inlet. The Riverwalk will transverse through many types of upland communities including environmentally sensitive lands, residential, marinas, commercial properties as well as waterfront parks.



RIVERWALK EVENTS

The Plaza Down Under on the Riverwalk (formerly known as the Riverwalk Events Plaza) is located at 25 South Coastal Way, under the Indiantown Road bridge, spanning the Intracoastal Waterway. The Town currently hosts two events on the plaza - Coastal Fest, annually in the spring, and Fall Fest, annually in the fall. These free, family-friendly events include live music, local food and craft vendors, bounce houses, face-painting, and a beer and wine area for adults. The plaza is also home to local non-profit events a few times a year and is also a great viewing location for the annual Holiday Boat Parade each December. Community Redevelopment Agency

The Community Redevelopment Agency (CRA) in Jupiter was created in 2003 to manage the area along the coastal and intracoastal waterways from Inlet Village south to Ocean Way. The CRA is funded primarily by tax increment revenues and grants.

The activities and programs offered within a Community Redevelopment Area are administered by the CRA. A five-member CRA “board” is created by the local government, which directs the Agency. The Board can be comprised of local government officials and/or other appointed individuals.

The CRA is responsible for developing and implementing a Community Redevelopment Plan that addresses the unique needs of each targeted area.


PARK HOURS FOR FAMILY USE

Family use hours are available at several of the Town's park fields that are typically used by athletic leagues. During the family use hours at the parks, residents are invited to use the specified fields for recreational sports with friends and family.

The schedule for family use hours shows which fields are open for public use and when, and they are updated seasonally based on sports and recreation league schedules. Because the designated times and fields change throughout the year, please be sure to check the online schedule periodically at jupiter.fl.us/Family-use-hours.

The Town asks that residents who wish to utilize the fields during the family use times follow the below simple rules that are in place to protect the integrity of the fields:

- Family use will only be allowed during the scheduled dates and times.
- Recreational activities must be sport-specific to the field being used.
- Organized activities such as formal games or practices, training sessions or private lessons are not permitted for family use hours.
- Training equipment of any kind is not allowed on the fields at any time.
- Golfing is not allowed on the fields.
- All posted park rules must be adhered to at all times.



Please keep in mind that the Town of Jupiter reserves the right to close fields at any time due to weather, excessive wear and tear of fields, and unexpected maintenance.

BOAT RAMPS

A boat trailer parking permit is required to use the ramps. For information on boat ramps visit jupiter.fl.us/Ecotourism and click "Boating/Ramps." Waterway Park - 3630 Indiantown Road, Jupiter

Waterway Park has 52 car/trailer Parking spaces, 24 car parking spaces, three concrete boat ramps, four 40-foot long floating staging docks, restrooms, a fishing pier and a yacht basin with 170 linear feet of floating staging docks. Other amenities include: canoeing/kayaking access, fishing pier and restroom facilities.



Burt Reynolds Park - 805 N. U.S. Highway 1, Jupiter

Conveniently located just south of Jupiter inlet, Burt Reynolds Park boat ramps are open 24/7 and only a few short idle minutes away from the inlet. There are two areas where you can drop your boat in at this park. The "West" side is for the larger boats as the East side ramps require you to clear the US1 bridge in either direction. Amenities at this park are plentiful on the east side with horseshoe pits, picnic areas with grills, shelters/pavilions, playground, restrooms, sand volleyball court and a non-motorized vessel launching beach. Burt Reynolds Park is also home to the River Center.



Jupiter Tequesta Athletic Association

Youth sports in the Town of Jupiter are organized through JTAA. ROGER DEAN CHEVROLET STADIUM

The Rodger Dean Chevrolet Stadium is located off Main Street by downtown Abacoa in Jupiter. The stadium complex is the only stadium in the country to host four minor league teams - Jupiter Hammerheads and Palm Beach Cardinals of the Class A-Advanced Baseball Florida State League; and Gulf Coast Marlins and Gulf Coast Cardinals of the Rookie-level Gulf Coast League.

The teams share the main stadium where the games are played; however, the teams have their own practice fields, outdoor batting cages, several pitching mounds and state-of-the-art conditioning rooms. The Stadium was built in 1998 and holds almost 7,000 people. The complex features luxury sky-box seating, two levels of permanent seating, parking and concessions.

The stadium has hosted both local and international community events. In September 2012, the stadium hosted the qualifying round for the 2013 World Baseball Classic. Teams from Spain, France, Israel and South Africa took part in the qualifier. Roger Dean Chevrolet Stadium also hosts fireworks for July 4 each year after its night games.

Beginning at the end of February, spring training games bring in many out of Town and out of state fans, but also allow residents to see major league teams play in their own back yard. 
Jupiter Beaches Map








